BAU CASE CONSULTATION

You watched TV's Criminal Minds show and movies like Silence of the Lambs, Red Dragon, and countless other movies and shows depicting FBI profilers. At the 2017 Orlando Symposium you have an opportunity to meet some real profilers of the FBI's Behavioral Analysis Unit (BAU), from Quantico, Virginia. BAU specializes in the study of offender and victim behavior in a variety of violent crimes and suspicious incidents involving both adults and children, including but not limited to homicide, sexual assault, abductions, mysterious disappearances, serial and mass murder, equivocal deaths, threat and risk assessments, terrorism, cyber crime, sexual exploitation of children, child molestation, child pornography, No Body Homicide investigations/prosecutions, and more.

The IHIA is once again arranging BAU profilers to be available at the 2017 Orlando Training Symposium to provide private and confidential case consultations during the symposium week.

In addition to unidentified offender profiles, BAU provides expertise and recommendations relative to major case management, suspect development, crime scene and evidence analysis, investigative strategy, media strategy, interview and interrogation strategies, prosecutorial strategy, personality assessments, as well as other operational, research, and training assistance. All BAU services are provided without charge to local, county, state, federal, tribal, and international law enforcement agencies and personnel.

Investigators who have active or cold criminal cases they may want to discuss with BAU profilers should contact BAU Major Case Specialist (MCS) Wayne Koka.
